Schools

Call to Order and Welcome | Shawn Sorensen

Meeting called to order at 7:02 PM by Co-Chair Shawn Sorensen.

Shawn acknowledged the larger than usual attendance and requested respectful conversation throughout the meeting. He apologized for being underprepared due to work commitments at Massey Theatre.

Land Acknowledgement

Shawn delivered a thoughtful land acknowledgement, recognizing the unceded Qayqayt territory. He expressed gratitude for the school's practice of helping students understand where they are being educated and noted the importance of having these conversations at home with families.

School District Update | Maya Russell & Marc Davidson Introduction

Maya Russell, School Board Chair and Trustee, introduced herself and Superintendent Marc Davidson. She acknowledged the importance of the items on the agenda for Qayqayt families.

French Immersion Program Review

Background and Rationale

The school district engaged a consultant who has done similar work with other districts. The consultant recommended consolidation of early French immersion programs. The district currently has three small early French immersion programs, with Qayqayt being the most challenged due to size constraints.

Proposed Changes

- **Recommendation:** Close early French immersion at Qayqayt in Fall 2026 and move the program to Herbert Spencer Elementary
- Herbert Spencer currently has 2 empty classrooms, expecting 2-3 more next year
- Every seat at Qayqayt will be available at Herbert Spencer no student losses expected
- Late French immersion remains a quality alternative program

Enrollment Context

- Metro Vancouver and BC have seen a net loss of students since June of last year
- New Westminster enrollment is up 1% (projected was 2%)
- Temporary demographic lull connected to federal immigration policy changes

Program Quality Considerations

Consolidation would allow for stronger French programming including:

- French-speaking administration
- Librarian who speaks French
- Education Assistants who are fluent in French
- More robust support resources for French immersion students

The goal is to have students leaving Grade 12 French immersion able to conduct interviews and conversations in French, not a watered-down program.

Financial Considerations

Each portable classroom costs a significant amount to operate. The district must make strategic decisions while remaining optimistic about funding for new schools, but needs to address current capacity issues for students now.

Timeline and Process

- Decision will be brought to the Board at the end of November 2025
- Open house planned for families to meet with staff
- Survey will be sent to all families in early and late French immersion
- Communications will be sent to families and staff at all three elementary immersion schools

Questions and Discussion

Q: How will 125 students be accommodated at Herbert Spencer with only 2 extra classrooms?

A: Not all Qayqayt early French immersion students are in catchment. Many families chose Qayqayt specifically because it was the only early French immersion in catchment. Herbert Spencer has sufficient capacity, and additional space will be available.

Q: Will there be more portables at Herbert Spencer?

A: No additional portables are planned. The existing classroom space at Herbert Spencer is sufficient.

Q: What about before and after school care at Herbert Spencer?

A: The district does not yet know what fee structures would look like for additional childcare options.

Q: Why consolidate at Herbert Spencer when it's farther from where families with young children live?

A: Herbert Spencer has the available capacity. To keep immersion at Qayqayt, the district would have to change attendance boundaries and push other students out of their catchment schools, which creates different equity issues.

Q: What about late French immersion as an alternative?

A: Late French immersion is a strong program. There is evidence supporting late immersion for English-first-language students in terms of getting fundamentals in English first. However, the district recognizes this is disappointing for families committed to early French immersion.
